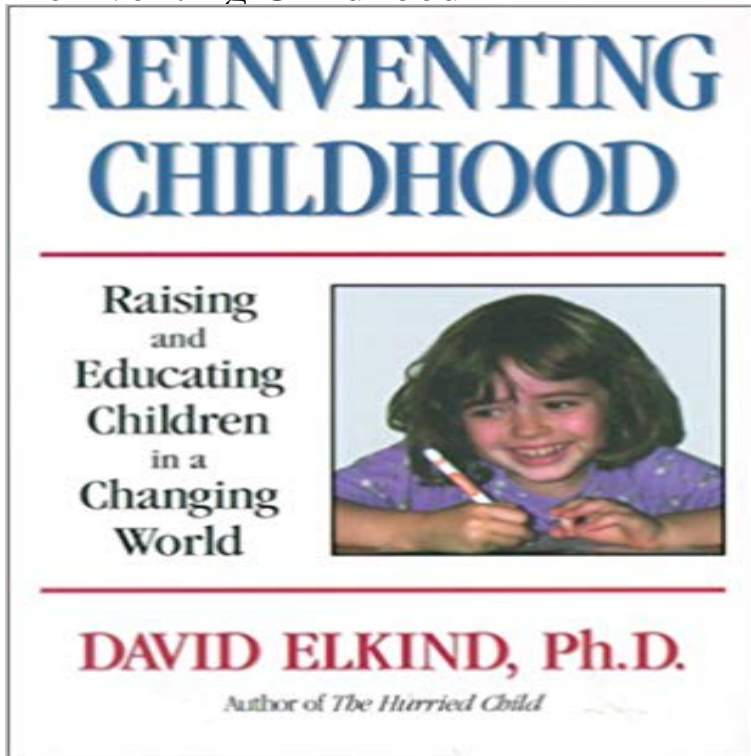


Reinventing Childhood
